

How many times have we complained about the traffic in EDSA? How many times have we experienced flood during rainy season? How many times have we heard of terrible news about violation of human rights of suspected drug pushers? We have all seen the chaos in our country and the global crises time and time again and probably have thought that someone should do something about them. If you have, then you'll probably understand the heart of Nehemiah in the process of rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem.

The first chapter of the Book of Nehemiah introduces him as a resident of Susa, the capital of the Persian Empire. From distant Persia, Nehemiah heard that its walls lay in rubble, even decades after the Jews returned home. What could Nehemiah do? Nehemiah occupied a very strategic position. He was a cupbearer to King Artaxerxes of the Medo-Persian Empire. As such, Nehemiah was pleased by God to seek all the resources to help rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. He had a burden for Jerusalem and acted on such burden. By Nehemiah's leadership, Jerusalem rose again from ruins. The walls were rebuilt in 52 days.

When God calls you, He will place you in a position where you loved. What God requires from His servants is a humble heart and courage to do His work. When Nehemiah heard

that the walls of Jerusalem were still broken down more than a half-century after the completion of the rebuilding of the temple, he "sat down and wept," fasting and praying before God (Neh. 1:4).

Rebuilding comes in different forms. Sometimes we need rebuilding as is our relationships. It could also be moments in our lives when we feel lost, stuck, in dire need of a fresh start, or wanting to rebuild our lives. You might be in a situation where you have to rebuild your career. Maybe you need to rebuild your relationship, where trust has been destroyed by your loved ones, or you need to rebuild after a financial crisis. No matter what your current situation might be, through the process of rebuilding, you can learn to trust God in a deeper way while growing stronger in your steadfast faith. Rebuilding doesn't mean that we have failed in life; it's actually an act of courage to admit that something is not working and we need to try again.

Rebuilding isn't easy, nor for the faint of heart. But one thing is sure, it requires courage. We need the courage to admit that what we have is beyond repair, and starting over is our only choice. Rebuilding takes courage and requires willingness to admit the mistakes of our past, assess the new direction we are taking, and hold ourselves accountable

for the course of action we have planned for to make a difference, the way he did to Nehemiah. In Jeremiah 1:10 God says "See, I have this day set you over the nations and over the kingdoms, to root out, and to pull down, and to destroy, and to throw down, to build, and to plant."

FOCIM, it is time for us to do the same thing. It is time to rebuild...one action at a time, one day at a time, one life at a time, one relationship at a time. It is time for us to rebuild our personal relationship with our Father. It's time for us to rebuild broken relationships in our homes for it should be our first ministry. It's time to rebuild altars in our government, so that we can recognize that the source of our past success and our future hope totally rests in Jesus Christ. And we must rebuild the altar in the church. If the home is going to get right and the government is going to improve, then the House of God has got to be the church of the redeemed who are not afraid to stand up for the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Whatever it takes to get your life on track with Almighty God, even when it means to rebuild everything you have worked hard for... do it! Remember His promise in Jeremiah 29:11. He has a better plan in store for you so let go and let God. You were created in His image and destined for greatness, but... are you willing to rebuild to get there?



KEEPING UP WITH GOD'S PACE: THE GEN-C HOLDS SUCCESSFUL THIRD VERTICAL YOUTH SERVICE

The Generation for Christ Youth Ministry held its third installment of the Vertical Youth Series last August 10. The said installment entitled "The Ascent: Keeping the Pace" had Sis. Jamesha De Guzman and Sis. Elipse Cielo as emcees.

EXPANDING THE TENT

FOCIM PREPARES FOR NEW SANCTUARY

In line with the mandate of the Church to relocate, build and expand, the Fullness of Christ International Ministries purchased a lot for the new sanctuary. The said 647 square meter lot is located on Mayon Street cor. Boni Avenue, a few blocks away from the MRT Boni Avenue Station on Edsa. Although all necessary documents are still being completed by the lot owner prior to full payment, the church has already planned its ground breaking ceremony on September 7, 2019. The highlight of the church ground breaking ceremony is the embedment of a time capsule containing FOCIM's memorabilia and paraphernalia in commemoration of the Church's milestone up to this day and beyond signifying the Lord's goodness and faithfulness.

Now that the church has already secured enough funds for the lot, the church is now focusing its efforts to raise funds for the building of the sanctuary. In an effort to encourage each member to contribute, since April of last year, the church has established a pledge board. The pledge board contains five hundred boxes, each box worth one hundred thousand pesos. Each member is

encouraged to freely choose how many boxes he or she wants to pledge for the building sanctuary. He or she decides what amount to give every Sunday until the desired pledge is completed. As of August 2019, 129 out of 500 boxes in the pledge board are already with pledges amounting to roughly Seven Million Seven Hundred Thousand Pesos.
Furthermore, 59 out of the said 129 boxes had its pledges fulfilled.

Other alternative ways to raise funds for building of the sanctuary are also being explored by FOCIM's Ministry Team. One is to have the existing apartments in the lot rented out prior to the construction of the new sanctuary. The lot currently contains eight two (2) storey apartments with a total floor area of 60 to 75 square meters each. Improvements and minor renovation are required for these apartments to be rentable again as some of its interiors have already deteriorated when they were vacated by their previous tenants. Each apartment can be rented out at around P 25,000.00 to P 35,000.00 a month, generating around P 300,000.00 to P420,000.00 a year.

The church is also interested in venturing out on other business in order to raise enough funds for the building of the sanctuary. All in all, the church's building fund is estimated to be around Fifty Million pesos (P50,000,000.00) as of August 2019.

YOUNG AT 65:

FOCIM's Senior Pastor Diwa C. Guinigundo Retires From the BSP

For most people, retirement is one of the biggest milestones in their careers. It marks both an end and a beginning; an end to years of deadlines, late hours, and morning routines, and a beginning to a new and unfamiliar stage in life. FOCIM's Senior Pastor and former Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) Deputy Governor, Diwa C. Guinigundo, recently retired after 41 years of service at the BSP. Hailed as one of the country's top economists, Pastor Diwa has been synonymous with monetary stability and fiscal policy in the Philippines. He has also been recognized around the world as an authority in central banking.

In this issue, The Menorah gets up close and personal with Pastor Diwa regarding his retirement.

Can you tell us briefly your career timeline? How many years did you serve in the BSP?

DCG: I spent nearly two years with NMYC-Department of Labor doing manpower planning and occupational forecasting. I enjoyed it very much but I thought it was rather narrow in scope and concern. All in, I spent 41 years and 5 months doing economic research and statistics, international operations and relations, monetary and treasury operations, loans and credit, asset management, currency management and regional monetary affairs. But in between those long years, I spent two years in London for my MSc in Economics, two years on secondment as head of research at the SEACEN Center in Kuala Lumpur and another two years on secondment as alternate executive director at the IMF in Washington DC.

How different was your life then? How did your routine look like when you first started? How would you compare that to your routine when you retired?

DCG: Before I started with BSP, life was very simple with very little demand on time and commitment. Manpower planning was rather a protracted activity. At the BSP, my time and life were rather very much engaged. Doing monetary policy and inflation management requires constant monitoring of the economy and the markets and the news. Short vacations were indeed short but not actually vacations because of the constant communication we had to sustain with other colleagues and media partners. Paper work was heavy I had to manage my time for my family and the church by sleeping late and waking up early. I caught up during weekends and the commute between the house and the office.











Did you lose contact with colleagues and friends along the way? How did that make you feel?

DCG: Unfortunately yes, with some of them. I had limited engagements with both my college and high school friends. I had very little time for the fraternity. But I made it a point to make time for the family and the church. I am the father of the family and shepherd of the Church.

What was the hardest decision that you had to make?

DCG: Any decision concerning the family and the church had been and will always be the hardest decision. That would require a season of prayer and searching for God's revelation.

Can you tell us about a time when you failed at something or fell short on a task, perhaps when you were still starting at the BSP? How did you handle it? What did that experience teach you?

DCG: My style of writing is quite engaged and a little biased to longer sentences. I tend to cover all grounds. My supervisor at the research department literally butchered my economic report I didn't recognize it at all. Since then I have avoided long, complicated sentences. They are a no no!

What was your favorite moment during your years in service? How did that moment change you?

DCG: My trips abroad. They gave me time to consolidate. Opportunities were there to look back and assess my performance and my life. I had more time to meditate on the word of God, prepare the list of themes and topics for the weekly preaching and do my own preaching. Those trips afforded me to regain my bearing and mindset.









What was the best advice that your heard from a mentor? From a peer?

DCG: There is no substitute to smart and hard work. Commitment and passion are the enabling elements. One of my subordinates reminded me that every decision I make has implications on real people. That means care and circumspection are crucial.

What do you miss most about your working life? What do you miss least?

DCG: I miss the regularity of my activities, the routine. I miss my staff who make my life so much easier. Someone to call for me, someone to get anything I need like research paper, statistics, someone to prepare my snacks, someone to drive me to work and back. I miss the opportunity to contribute to public welfare. I miss my speaking engagements and meetings with public sector colleagues, credit rating agencies and multilateral institutions.

I don't miss the long hours.

Tell us about your life nowadays. What did you do the on the first day of your retirement? What are you plans moving forward?

DCG: I woke up late. I went to the gym with Sis Apple. I plan to strengthen our leadership and discipleship programs in FOCIM. I also plan to continue with the Touching Heaven Changing Earth Movement. I intend to sustain my Thursday columns in the Manila Bulletin. I am preparing to serve in the Board of one of the departments of the Singapore Management University. With other former senior officials in the ASEAN, I am preparing to write a book on regional financial integration. And of course, look more closely at my investment portfolio including real estate.

If you could give your younger self some advice, what would you say?

DCG: Take more time to smell the roses. Keep yourself healthier.

In spite of retiring from public service, I continuously serve as the Head of the Jesus Loves You Celebration Church Radio Ministry and preach every Friday at 9:00 PM over DWBL with program entitled Life's Turning Point. I am also a member of Fire and Glory Prophetic team where we conduct conferences in various churches internationally.

WHAT HAS BEEN THE GREATEST CHALLENGE THAT YOU HAVE OVERCOME THUS FAR? WHAT HAS BEEN THE ROLE OF GOD AND YOUR FAMILY DURING SUCH TIME?

The greatest challenge I am facing now are the physical concerns of my wife. We regularly go to the hospital for treatment and consultation with the doctors.

We have no other option, In Him we live and move and have our being. It is Christ or Never.

SPIRITUAL ENGAGEMENT WITH OUR LOCAL POLICEMEN

If there is anyone in government whose ubiquitous presence intrudes our daily lives, it is the policeman on the beat. Whether untangling traffic mess, running after criminal suspects, or helping resolve domestic/family issues in the community, the policeman is the ever present symbol of legal authority on the ground. Whatever action or utterance he makes in addressing an issue on the street level instantly becomes the law to be followed.

The policeman is not always an impartial arbiter. Like any human being, he is subject to weaknesses that color his judgment and transform him into a lawbreaker himself. Tales of immorality, bribe inducing and taking or worse, involvement in organized

crime itself, abound across the entire force.

The good news is that the hierarchy of the Philippines National Police (PNP) itself recognizes this reality and has launched programs to address the problem decisively. During the administration of President Fidel V. Ramos, a moral regeneration program in the police ranks was launched.

More recently, the PNP leadership has updated this initiative, recognizing that a spiritual component must be integrated in the program. The PNP website announced it formally in early July this year, as follows: "The program dubbed as the Focused Reformation/Reorientation and Moral Enhancement for Police Officers in Line with Internal

Cleansing Efforts (FORM POLICE) is a month-long training that aims to address the increasing number of wayward policemen.

"The training is part of the revitalized three-pronged Internal Cleansing Program of the PNP under the Restorative approach wherein, the training focuses on changing the attitudes and perceptions of the erring policemen and instill in them professionalism and integrity to bring them back to their oath of service, honor, and justice."

The training referred to the intensive briefing of PNP Squad Leaders drawn from the police ranks, together with "Life Coaches" nominated by the different Christian, Muslim and Catholic denominations.

Earlier than July this year, the Mandaluyong Christian Churches Association (MCCA) already got involved in the organization of the PNP Squad System. Through MCCA, the Fullness of Christ International Ministries(FOCIM) joined the efforts and nominated Brothers Robert Lee Guerrero, Angel Dionisio and Elso Cabangon to the pool of Life Coaches assigned to the different police community precincts in Mandaluyong.

The PNP came out with a comprehensive Squadding Concept Manual that serves as a guide to both Squad Leaders and Life Coaches in conducting a weekly two-hour session in different precincts.



Realizing that any effort to reform the police ranks must have spiritual component to help instill discipline and prevent misbehavior and misconduct in the ranks, the manual focused on the objective of having "God-Centered, Service Oriented and Family-Based PNP Personnel". It emphasized reliance on God's purpose and will expressed in Psalms 127:1. "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the watchman stays awake in vain".

While doctrinal issues are avoided at squadding sessions, the discussion of moral and spiritual values and sharing of everyday experiences ultimately and inevitably lead to practical Biblebased discipleship. Currently, FOCIM Life Coaches are engaged in squadding three times a week, covering Mandaluyong precincts 2 and 5.

We understand that coordinating everyone's schedules can be difficult - how was that like?

We were a total of 14 persons and having to squeeze everyone's plans was indeed a great challenge. It helped that months ahead, we already prepared a calendar to plot out the cities we would like to go to and activities we wanted to do. We also worked around the request of some family members. Example, when I had a Handstand training in Sta Monica, we also scheduled on that day a visit to the Google office in the same area to maximize the trip. The rest of the family also took a stroll down the beach while kids went biking. Then they all had yummy umami burger for lunch while waiting for me. One time, my nephew had to go to a far place to attend a wedding. When we learned that there was a major shopping area near the wedding venue, we all decided to go. Not a time wasted!

While this all sounded pretty planned out, there were still plenty of unexpected turns. The greater challenges were felt during shopping days. 
This trip was indeed a testament of God's faithfulness to our family. Our hearts are full.

Any plans on going back?


God willing, we definitely would love to go back.


